


# The Village of Shotteswell

The Parish of Shotteswell lies on the extreme south easterly edge of the County of Warwickshire, forming a peninsula, and is surrounded on three sides by Oxfordshire.

The parish comprises of 1,305 acres most of which is rich agricultural land, for the most part farmed by men who live in the village. The village itself lies on the east slope of a small range of hills that runs north from Banbury and about 16 miles from Warwick, it is just off the B4100. The village boasts some extensive and beautiful views over the valley. The Avon, a tributary of the Cherwell, separates the parish from Oxfordshire on the east, as does another small tributary on the west, the northern boundary being defined by an even smaller stream. The cottages and farms in the village are mainly constructed of Ferruginous limestone – known as Hornton stone. The scientific name captures nothing of the rare qualities of Hornton stone, which can range from a warm light brown colour through to brown-purple, grey and green to various shades of mauve and blue. A stone noted for its hard wearing properties and ease of working, it is little wonder that architects and artists have admired and used the


stone mined at the nearby Hornton quarries for centuries. Very few of the cottages remain thatched today; most of the original buildings are largely clustered around the church and forming steep and narrow lanes.

The modern name, Shotteswell, seems to have been derived from the old English words "Scota" or "Sceota", meaning offshoot or brow of a hill with the word "well" added, the name has been spelt in the past in various ways of which the most common are "Cheteswell" and "Sacheswell". Old inhabitants sometimes refer to the village as "Satchell" giving perhaps a hint of how it used to be spelt or the accent of the locals!


The neighbouring village of Warmington (two miles further north) is mentioned in the Doomsday book with a very large area of land and it would seem that the present parish of Shotteswell was in those days part of the parish of Warmington. The first Lords of the manor to be named were the Earls of Warwick and at one time, the Earl granted sub-Lordship to the ancestors of John de Dive. He was followed by Robert Fitzwith and later in the reign of King John by the family of the Manards. There is a reference to a gift of six cottages by the Earl of Warwick to the Canon of Studely, but the reference is undated, as also is another gift by the Earl of Warwick to the Canon of Clattercote. At any rate during the reign of

Henry VIII, Sir Thomas Pope became the owner of the lands that had been given to the Monks of Studely and Clattercote and later obtained possession of the Manor and the Living. This was at the same time as Sir Thomas Pope who

founded Trinity College Oxford and became the owner of Wroxton Abbey. The Manor (right) passed to the North family who has since sold their properties within the village. Lord North planted the Coronation Tree (Horse Chestnut, junction of Middle Lane and Coronation Lane) to commemorate the Coronation of King George V in June 1911.



The parish of Shotteswell became a separate benefice in 1381, before that it seems to have been part of Warmington. The parish church shows evidence in the Norman arcade of a previous church having been enlarged in 1100. Further enlargements took place in the 14<sup>th</sup> century, when an English arcade was added presumably the chancel and the tower. The church is one of the finest in the district, being well cared for and kept in very good repair. There is also evidence in the vestry of the original Saxon building which must have been little more than a Monks cell, where one of the Monks from Warmington would come from time to time to minister to the people of the village. The church registers go back to about 1500 and it seems clear that Shotteswell was then and had been for some years a parish of its own. In 1925, the parish was again combined with Warmington as Vicar of Shotteswell, the Rector also being responsible for Ratley and Radway. In 2007 again with restructuring of the Clergy the churches combined with Kineton and Combrooke, making the priest in charge responsible for the six parishes, aided by an associate minister (part time).

The church bells were augmented and re-re-hung in 1996, having been restored to their former glory; a lot of the village men helped with this project and were featured in the Banbury Guardian towing the bells along the churchyard path, on sturdy ropes. The bells sound wonderful and practice sessions take place on a Tuesday evening, anyone who would love to try their hand at

campanology is most welcome to come along. To celebrate the Millennium the church is now floodlit at weekends and on special occasions.


The populations of Shotteswell are given as, 336 in1841, 242 in 1881, 217 in 1961, and 249 in 2008, of which 52 are persons under the age of 25.

Recorded charities consist of two pieces of land, Maidens Dole (about one and three quarters of an acre) and Poor's Lot about three quarters of an acre which was set aside in 1793. The income from these was to be used for the benefit of the poor persons living in the parish and at one time one loaf of bread was distributed to the parishioners on Good Friday, the remainder being distributed in cash, but now the income is used to buy coal for distribution to Old Age Pensioners or the cheque equivalent if they no longer have coal fires. The charity trustees are the Vicar (ex – officio) and two representatives appointed by the parish council.

At one time the village had its own bakery this was to be found originally at the Flying Horse and latterly at the (Old) Bakehouse, in Bakehouse lane. Two village shops, one at the (Old) Post Office, the other at Red Roof and then moving to The Flying Horse. Milk deliveries, were made from here to surrounding villages. Three pubs once existed in the village. The last to close was The Flying Horse, in Middle Lane. The Wobbly Wheel was formally known as the Hare and Hounds. The Caravan shop stands on the site of the old garage on the B4100, which closed with the prospect of the M40 and competition from the supermarkets.

Next door to the Farm shop is where the village policeman used to reside. At one time the village had its own road man, who swept the lanes by hand. Shotteswell had six working farms. The First turn into the village is much lower now than it used to be, this was modified to take out the big dip on the main road, formally known as the A41, now down graded to the B4100, which had become a notorious black spot (if you look carefully you can see evidence of where the bank has been cut away). Fortunately, the mile stone on the First Turn was restored a few years ago by Trevor Dean formally of this parish. There are some families that remain within the village who can trace their ancestry back in Shotteswell for more than five hundred years....




Above: Middle Lane, 1910 - 1919

Below: Snuff Lane. 1939




# Archaeological finds in Shotteswell


Iron Age and Roman Materials (The Roman period comes after the Iron Age but before the Saxon period)



These are photographs showing crop marks of linear features and enclosure pits, some four hundred metres north west of Shotteswell. Fragments of a Roman marble sarcophagus have also been found, three hundred metres south east. of Langcomb Covert. Pottery, mainly Roman but with some Iron Age and a coin of Constantine, have also be found. As recently as 2003 a further excavation was undertaken looking for further artefacts.

Crop marks of linear features, in nearby field in the parish. Crop marks appear as light and dark marks in growing/ripening crops. These marks relate to differences in the soil below. Parched lines of grass may indicate stone walls. Crops that grow over stone features often ripen earlier, because there is less moisture where the wall lies.


### War Years




In 1983, Louisa Gilbert initiated the purchase of a poppy wreath to be laid at Shotteswell Church; ironically the wreath was to be laid just eleven days before she herself died unexpectedly. Her husband a Royal Navy Officer had been killed on the Courageous the first Naval vessel to be lost in the Second World War. The laying of the wreath has been continued ever since, at first being paid for by the church, however it is now purchased on behalf of the parish by the Parish Council, and has been laid for many years by Bill Spencer an ex-veteran of the Second World War.

# **Profumo Connections**


1963 Shotteswell was embroiled in the Profumo scandal when the press besieged the village searching for John Profumo. John Profumo was the 5th Baron Profumo, his father had been an Italian Baron and Kings Counsel, emigrating to the UK in 1885 and building his fortune on insurance. John Profumo was married to the very glamorous film actress Valerie Hobson, John had been the M.P. for Stratford on Avon, rising to the ranks of Minister for War. Following the discovery of the Christine Keeler affair, he resigned as M.P. and fled from London. The Profumo scandal

proved a heady mixture of intelligence secrets, sex and the aristocracy.

The family home had been at Avon Carrow at Avon Dassett, but Elizabeth, John Profumo's sister lived here in Shotteswell, and so the reporters came here too. John Profumo was a regular visitor to his sister, at both of the two Profumo homes in the village, Mount Stuart and Cherry Lodge. The disgraced M.P. then devoted his time to charitable and philanthropic works and was awarded the CBE, in recognition of this. As time went by he was seen to have been forgiven, he had after all done the honourable thing and resigned, even being invited to Margret Thatcher's 70<sup>th</sup> birthday celebrations and seated by her majesty Queen Elizabeth II. When Miss Profumo died the funeral service was held here in St Laurence Church and her body was later taken to London for internment.




Former Profumo residences



# HELPFUL INFORMATION


There are 105 houses in Shotteswell and approximately 240 villagers (dwellings stretching from the Slated Barn down to Valley Farm and even half of the Wobbly Wheel pub are within our parish). The village pamphlet was first issued in 1970, fourth revision in 1990, fifth revision in 1997 sixth revision in 2000, seventh revision in 2004 and eighth revision 2008

#### Trees

All trees over seven and a half inches in diameter, 1.5 meters from the ground require strict permission from Stratford District Council to either be pruned or felled. This also includes Fruit trees as from (1999). Failure to comply with this regulation carries a fine of a maximum of twenty thousand pounds. Shotteswell was designated as a Conservation area in 1969. If you wish to undertake work to prune or fell your tree you must apply to the Head of Planning, Stratford District Council, Elizabeth House, Church Street, Stratford-upon-Avon, Warwick's, there is currently no fee for this service, or telephone 01789 267575.

#### Bonfires

At the request of many residents we ask for some consideration for your fellow neighbours. Please refrain from having bonfires where at all possible but if you do need one please be aware of the weather conditions and that many people may wish to be outside gardening sunbathing, playing or drying washing.

Remember that it is far more environmentally friendly to compost or use your green wheelie bin for garden waste. Bonfires add significantly to the Green house effect they are also severely detrimental to asthma suffers or anyone with heart complaints. Aside from the green wheelie bins it is possible to have the chipping service for a very nominal fee available from the County Council

Wood Chipping Service

For a nominal charge of (fifteen pounds) you can avail yourself of this service. Contact 01926 738827 (9.30am - 12.30pm answer phone available after these hours)

The chippings will be left with the householder in bags to be used for mulching

There are sound environmental reasons for keeping your chipped green waste and using it in the garden, land filling garden waste contributes to the creation of Methane gas which is a potent greenhouse gas thought to contribute to climate change. Also by using your own chippings as mulch you will reduce the need to buy chemical weed controls in your garden







Shopping

The National Herb Centre is situated on the B4100 between Warmington and Shotteswell and boasts a tea room, gift shop, children's activities and wide array of herbs and plants.

Refuse Collection

Collected by Stratford District Council on Mondays except for holiday periods, currently refer to sacks for details, but in August of 2008 the system will be revised with the advent of the new recycling scheme.

N.B - Colour of table demarcates the bin to be used (bins will be delivered during June/July 2008)

Additional information relating to the new collection of refuse.

- Food waste (scraps of meat, cooked vegetables, peelings e.t.c.) may be wrapped in newspaper if so desired.
- Non recyclables (grey bin) will be items such as babies nappies, incontinence pads, polystyrene, plastic bags (for a comprehensive list please check notice board from June/July 2008).
- Recyclables will be glass, paper, cans and tins, cardboard, plastics (anything bottle shaped –
  please remove lids and squash, so removing the air and maximising the room in your bin).

This system has been introduced to avoid the County Council paying a premium in fines for using too much landfill space. We will all be playing our part in not letting our rubbish 'COST THE EARTH'.

Back door collections for those already registered will continue and contingency plans, although not yet announced, will be made for people having difficulties with steps etc. The scheme does not come into force until August. (When the bins are delivered please **do not** put food waste in with garden materials until advised as the new composting plant is not yet up and running!)

Bulky waste can be collected by arrangement with the District Council e.g. old cookers e.t.c. (tel: 01789 267575).





The playing field has thus far played host to barbeques, fun days, games and even Birthday parties. There has also been a helicopter land to ferry a bride to her reception.

The field will shortly have additional seating due to the kind donation of a further bench in memory of Richard Corbett from his wife, family and friends.

Regular inspections are undertaken by the Councillors. In order to keep the playing field clean and tidy patrons of the field are asked to take litter home and ensure that the gates are closed. It is hoped that residents will also respect that dogs are not to be taken into the field as they can scare small children and their excrement can cause Toxocara. Regular inspections are undertaken but should you encounter any problems please contact the Clerk. It should be remembered that there is **no kite flying permitted in the field** 

Further acquisitions of children's play equipment are planned to be installed in the near future. Discussions are currently being undertaken, and funding sought, to facilitate Boules area and fitness equipment for the adult community.

The entire funding of the equipment and fencing of the field has been gratefully provided by grants and VAT refunds.

The playing field was awarded the accolade at the Warwickshire Rural Community Council of "Highly Commended". It is hoped that members of the community will derive much pleasure from this amenity for many years to come.

# The Role of the Parish Council

This is an elected body to represent the village on issues such as planning etc. Any complaints regarding local services should be channelled via the parish council to avoid duplication of reports to the local authorities. Over the years useful contacts have been forged and generally we know who to get the best results from. Over the past few years the parish council have managed to achieve the following for the benefit of the residents of this parish:-

> Replacement of the sign on the Motorway bridge junction

Secured the coloured studding on the B4100 to assist with locating the turns into the village during foggy weather.

> Planted trees to commemorate the Millennium and Trafalgar Day

Continued with the bulb planting project to make the village look delightful in the spring months. With daffodils, snowdrops and native bluebells.

> Continued planting up the tubs with flowers throughout the various seasons.

- > Installed the four benches around the village. Benches are sited at the Green, New Road, Chapel Lane and Mollington Road
- > Secured three further litter bins, one on the B4100 lay-by, the other being outside of the sewerage gate on the Mollington lane and Bakehouse lane
  - Kiosk: successfully negotiated to retain the red kiosk. Arranged for a new letter box with a bigger opening to accommodate larger items of post
- > Installed the green salt bins, to avoid damaging the verges with salt leaching into the nearby vegetation.
- > Campaigned and had re-stored the winter gritting route through the village, which also benefited the entire county.
- > Assisted the village hall in its grant applications for funding to install the new disabled toilets and represented them at the Southam funding committee

> Paid for the new heaters in the village hall

> Paid for the materials for the new churchyard path

> Successfully negotiated for the playing field, applied for funding to enable the playground equipment and safety surfacing to be installed.

> Installed a new notice board outside of the bus shelter and surfacing.

> Implemented a scheme to help the wild life of the village with the frog signs

> Successfully negotiated with the DFT and the County Council for new signs to alleviate the problems with articulated Lorries passing through the village, which will again benefit the county.

Negotiated with the highways to have the roads resurfaced and for special funding to enable the repairs to the drains to be undertaken.

Arranged various celebratory events for example, Trafalgar day, Bonfire/Halloween nights, Children's Christmas parties and the Golden Jubilee. The Golden Jubilee encompassed a Fete, balloon race, children's party, sports day, dog show, culminating in a 50's themed Evening with a magnificent buffet, disco, bonfire and fireworks display. Yards of bunting created by dedicated villagers adorned the marquee, which was erected in Laurel Farm grounds. This followed with a bonfire night and Halloween party in the autumn. The finale of the year culminated in a magical Christmas party. During the year each household received a Jubilee rose tree with the compliments of the parish council. A 'T' towel was commissioned showing all of the village children who drew illustrations of themselves. A special Jubilee mug was commissioned as a souvenir. The Trafalgar evening was celebrated in the hall with a scrumptious meal of Normandy pork and homemade apple pies. The entertainment was provided by a notable entertainer dressed as a redcoat, who fired shots from a real musket, during the evening. The evening culminated with a magic show, bonfire and fireworks. Of course none of these events would have been possible without the help of stalwart volunteers who made the events so successful, which is greatly appreciated.

> Arranged for all the Street name plates to be repainted.

> Arranged for the introduction of Hatch markings on the B4100 at the turns into the village to enhance safety.
