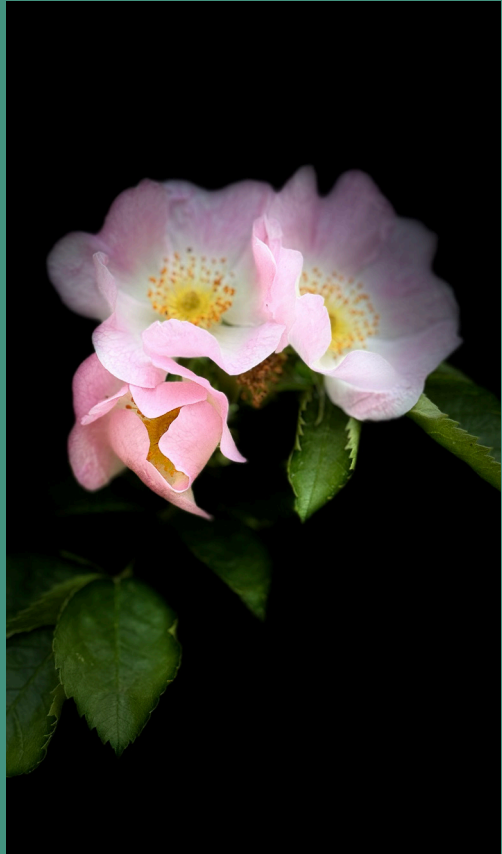

Road Works

This past winter has presented significant challenges with potholes due to the exceptionally wet weather conditions. Residents can be assured that any potholes or road defects identified are promptly reported.

While this is a nationwide issue, Warwickshire's road maintenance standards remain generally high. Urgent repairs will, of course, be prioritised.

Potholes have been reported along the B4100 between the junctions at Second Turn, Back Hill, Bakehouse Lane, and Church Lane.

Following communication with the Highways team, arrangements have been made for gullies to be dug at Second Turn to improve drainage. This should help alleviate the issue of standing water in the area.

A considerable amount of time has been dedicated to addressing multiple water leaks along Mollington Road. Initially, these concerns were dismissed by Severn Trent Water, however, continued persistence resulted in the identification and successful repair of three separate leaks.

Concerns have also been raised regarding Bakehouse Lane, where a partial road collapse occurred. This was addressed through the installation of a larger replacement land drain. Despite these works, issues remain ongoing and have been formally reported for further investigation.

It should be noted that gullies within the village are maintained on a three-year cyclical cleaning programme. As a result, jetting operations are typically only undertaken in circumstances where there is a demonstrable risk to life or property due to flooding. The Clerk regularly clears the gully tops.

It is anticipated that surface dressing works may be carried out next year, however, this has yet to be formally confirmed.

Slow Road Markings

At the request of the Parish Council, we arranged for the “SLOW” road markings to be repainted, as they had become almost completely worn away.

There has been a noticeable increase in traffic along Second Turn, with some drivers appearing not to fully consider the road conditions. Following a prolonged request, approval was eventually granted for an additional “SLOW” marking on Second Turn.

I would like to express my thanks to the Clerk for her persistence in securing this outcome, and to Highways for their agreement. The new road marking has been installed just before Redlands Farm.



Trees

Although the Parish Council funds the routine maintenance of roadside verges on an annual basis, there are occasional instances where unforeseen issues arise, such as fallen or overhanging branches encroaching onto the roadway.

When such situations occur, the Parish Council makes every reasonable effort to respond promptly and arrange for the matter to be addressed. This was the case with the recent incidents reported on Mollington Road and Middle Lane, where appropriate action was taken to manage and resolve the obstruction, usually I attend to these issues having the necessary equipment and am sometimes assisted by Cllr Pearson.

A further tree has fallen by the entrance to the playing field and this will be resolved shortly.



Telephone Reconfigurations

Following a resident experiencing a loss of telephone and internet services, it was identified that squirrels had caused significant damage by chewing through the overhead cables. As a result, BT advised that a simple reconnection to the existing pole was not feasible. Concerns were raised regarding overcrowding on the pole, as well as the existing cables being positioned too low across the road, necessitating a more comprehensive solution involving repositioning at a greater height.

In addition, the attending engineer highlighted that several other cables in the vicinity had also sustained damage and were at risk of failure. This raised wider concerns for neighbouring residents, with a clear need to prevent further disruption and ensure continuity of service across the area.

Over the course of approximately twelve months, multiple site visits and discussions took place with BT engineers to identify and agree upon a suitable reconfiguration. An initial proposal suggested the installation of a new telegraph pole on the Village Green side of the road. However, this option was not considered acceptable, particularly in light of the Parish Council's longstanding efforts to reduce the number of telegraph poles within the village. Furthermore, such an installation would have had an adverse impact on a nearby resident.

Through persistence and careful consideration, the Clerk worked diligently to explore alternative, less intrusive solutions. Ultimately, a revised approach was agreed, made possible through the cooperation and goodwill of a local householder. This solution successfully delivered a number of key benefits, including improved security and reliability of

service, a reduction in the number of cables crossing the road, avoidance of installing an additional pole and full compliance with relevant health and safety requirements.

The Parish Council would like to place on record its sincere thanks to the householder for their invaluable assistance. Their willingness to accommodate the works was essential in achieving a positive outcome for the wider community.

I would like to extend our appreciation to the Clerk for her perseverance and commitment in pursuing a solution that balanced practicality with the best interests of residents and the local environment.

Sewerage Works

Residents may have been wondering what has been taking place for these many months at the sewerage works.

A new filtration system has been installed to improve the quality of the discharge into the local water system, which is very important. There was also a new pipe installed on the corner of Middle Lane/Bakehouse Road junction. This doesn't mean that capacity has been increased, just that the current system has been vastly improved.



New Road Garages.

Residents may be interested to know that a number of the garages were previously left empty, as they were not in a suitable condition to be rented out. We have made efforts to encourage Orbit to carry out the necessary improvements so these garages can be brought back into use as rentable units.

We are delighted that this work has now been carried out and that several of our residents have been able to avail themselves of these units, we understand that there may still be one available to rent.

The refurbished garages have a new door and lock and the whole block benefitted from a new roof.

The number to contact if you are interested in the garage is displayed on the door of the garage.

New Road Green, grassed area has also been added to the regular programme of mowing from this year.

The green and the splays are now in the ownership of the Parish Council. This was undertaken to benefit our residents at New Road.

Telephone Kiosk

At the time of last year's Chairman's report, the telephone kiosk was once again under threat. I am pleased to report that we have successfully secured its retention, ensuring it remains available, particularly in times of power cuts and emergencies. To help maintain this valuable resource, residents are encouraged to make occasional calls from the kiosk.



During the year, it came to our attention that the telephone was not functioning. This has now been repaired and is fully operational.

In addition, the surrounding path has been cleared once again. Our sincere thanks go to Gordon for his continued efforts in keeping the area tidy.

Our kiosk looks set for fame as a film crew were spotted on several occasions filming at the box!



Jan Burgess Commemorative Tree

The Parish Council wished to plant a commemorative tree in memory of our much loved and highly respected councillor, Jan. A keen gardener, as all who knew her will remember, it was felt that a tree would be a fitting tribute. In consultation with her family, a suitable tree was selected, and residents were invited to attend the planting.

Although the weather forecast predicted heavy rain, the conditions improved just as we gathered, allowing us to share a few words and complete the planting together. The following week, a commemorative plaque was installed, providing a further opportunity for residents to come together and pay their respects.

The tree has been placed in a prominent position and has been underplanted with snowdrop and daffodil bulbs in her honour, creating a lasting and meaningful tribute.

These are the words spoken at the ceremony for anyone who wasn't able to be present.

“Thank you all for coming here today to see Jan’s tree planted. It means a great deal to gather together in her honour and to mark her memory with something living, rooted and lasting.

Jan was not only a much respected and deeply valued member of the council, but also a true friend to so many of us. Her presence brought steadiness, warmth and a sense of shared purpose to every room she entered.

You could always rely on Jan for sage wisdom, unwavering support and quiet loyalty. She had a gift for listening carefully, offering thoughtful guidance and helping others find clarity in the moments that mattered. Her contribution to our community went far beyond her role, she was part of the heart of village life.

She will always be missed, but she will also always be remembered. And as this tree grows, it will stand as a symbol of her strength, kindness and the enduring impact she had on us all.”



Steps & Footpaths

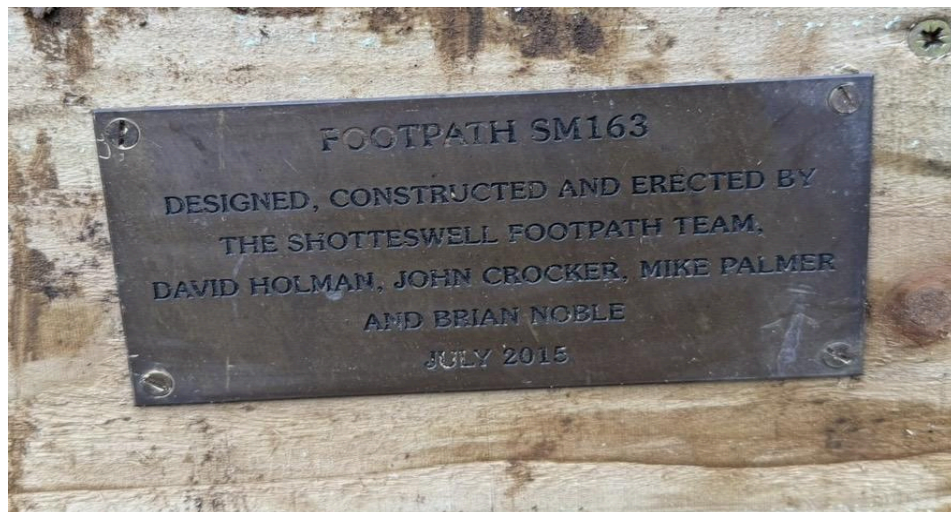
It had long been recognised that the steps leading to the footpaths had reached the end of their natural lifespan. Having been repaired on numerous occasions over the years, they had begun to deteriorate to the point where they posed a potential safety hazard. Following discussions with members of the footpath team and with their full support, we undertook the project of replacing the steps to ensure continued safe access for all users.

As is often the case with such projects, the process proved more complex than initially anticipated. However, we persevered, and once the necessary approvals had been secured and suitable quotations obtained, work commenced on the replacement. We are pleased to confirm that the project was successfully completed.

During the course of the work, a commemorative plaque was discovered on the side of the original steps. This plaque, which acknowledges the contribution of the former footpath team, was carefully preserved and reinstated on the new structure as a tribute to their original efforts and vision. David Holman fondly recalled the original installation, even remembering how the steps were once laid out in his garage and was particularly pleased to see their renewal.

Although the bannister was added at a later date, it has since become an integral part of the structure and has been retained as part of the updated design. We are confident that these improvements will ensure many more years of safe and reliable use, while also providing reassurance to both local residents and the footpath team, who no longer need to be concerned about the condition of the steps.





The Parish Council was alerted to a further incident involving obstruction of a public footpath and fly tipping. This particular case involved a quantity of discarded wood that had been thrown into the brook situated in the field leading towards the M40.

Upon being notified, the Clerk contacted the landowner to investigate the matter. It was confirmed that the landowner was not responsible for the materials, which were identified as remnants from recent fencing works carried out alongside the M40.

The wood was safely retrieved and disposed of appropriately, ensuring that it no longer posed a risk to local wildlife or obstructed the natural flow of water.

The Parish Council would like to express its sincere thanks to the landowner for addressing the issue so quickly and responsibly.

Fly Tipping

There has been a noticeable increase in fly-tipping incidents recently, particularly in the B4100 lay-by and along Mollington Road. While these incidents are reported promptly, the ongoing cost of clearing the waste places a continued financial burden on the local district council.

It is unclear whether this rise may be linked to the recent changes at the Alkerton Household Waste Recycling Centre, which now operates a booking only system and charges a £15 fee per visit for non Oxfordshire residents. The Parish Council has raised this matter with the County Council, exploring whether reciprocal arrangements with neighbouring authorities could be introduced, given the site's close proximity. Such arrangements are already in place elsewhere, for example, some counties utilise facilities in Warwickshire, which helps to minimise unnecessary travel.

We are also aware that several Oxfordshire councillors are advocating for a review of these new measures and we support their efforts.

For residents seeking alternative facilities, the nearest recycling centres are:

Wellesbourne Household Waste Recycling Centre (CV35 9QZ) – located opposite the entrance to Sainsbury's. This site is open on Mondays (excluding bank holidays) and weekends, although opening hours vary between summer and winter.

Leamington Spa Recycling Centre, Princes Drive (CV31 3PH) – open daily. Typical hours are 9:30am–3:15pm on weekdays and 8:30am–5:45pm on weekends, with reduced winter hours (weekends 8:30am–4:15pm).

Residents are encouraged to check current opening times before travelling.



On a more positive note the council will now accept plastic flower pots which will reduce the amount going to land fill, see below for guidance on this new initiative.

There have been several incidents of refuse lorry fires where batteries have not been kept separate from the general waste, please leave these in a separate bag on top of your bins to help protect the refuse collectors.

Did you know that it currently costs Stratford around £300k per year to remove contamination from kerbside recycling.

Around 42 tonnes of food waste incorrectly went into the blue lidded bin and around 1,622 tonnes was non recyclable waste such as sanitary waste/nappies, construction waste, clinical waste and liquids.

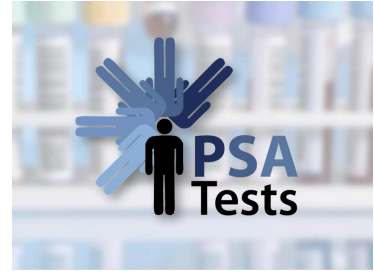

Children's Playing Field

In order to enhance the security of residents whose properties back onto the playing field, new, more robust fencing has recently been installed. This improvement has been made following careful consideration of resident concerns and aims to provide a safer and more secure environment for those affected.

We would also like to take this opportunity to remind all residents who own dogs to be mindful and considerate of others. In particular, we kindly request that dogs are not taken onto the playing field. This area is primarily intended for use by children and families and it is important to maintain a clean, safe, and welcoming space for their activities.

We continue to receive a number of complaints regarding this matter, and your cooperation in respecting this request is greatly appreciated. By working together, we can help ensure the playing field remains a pleasant and safe environment for everyone in the community.



Following a few intermittent power cuts we discovered that a pole on the Mollington Road was arching, the Parish Council contacted the electricity company and they have rectified the fault.

Green Salt Bins

This winter has seen relatively little snowfall, however, we did experience some significant periods of ice. We extend our thanks to all those who assisted with salting the lanes, an act which greatly supports those less able and can make a meaningful difference within the community. Please continue to use salt sparingly, as even a small amount is effective in melting ice.

This also brought to mind the period some years ago when the Two Turns were not gritted and the considerable effort made by the Parish Council to have this addressed. This remains an important part of local history that newer residents may not be aware of.

It is also worth noting that comparably sized parishes such as Avon Dassett, with properties on similar terrain, have three grit bins, Northend has four and Warmington has three. In contrast, our parish benefits from fourteen strategically placed grit bins, provided over the years by the Parish Council and replenished by Warwickshire County Council. Please notify the Clerk if any grit bins are found to be empty so that arrangements can be made for timely replenishment of salt

Finance

Please find below the Parish Council accounts for this year. We remain committed to delivering the highest standard of services while maintaining a careful awareness of the financial impact on our residents.

Through continued diligence and prudent financial management, we have maintained the parish precept at £6,500. This has been achieved despite drawing on a significant portion of our reserves during the year.
